St. Paul's greetings in his letters acknowledge his prayers for those congregations as well as their prayers for him and his ministry. He commends them for their faithful spread of the gospel in their own communities and beyond.

So where does prayer fit into the ministry and life of Hope Lutheran Church?

A few months ago, I began to receive prayer requests for the Healing Team's prayer ministry. While I always knew the power and comfort of the prayers of God's people, this ministry put me and the team members in touch with the congregation and community at their most vulnerable. Grateful responses to our prayers were a reminder that the prayers were helpful and appreciated. At the same time, Pastor Pamela and I decided to include a special announcement prayer highlighting the ministries that live out our mission statement.

Acknowledging the way that prayer undergirds Hope's vision and ministry, are there ways we can extend that vision to include those who are part of our gathered community?

In 2024 the Healing Team's Prayer ministry will encourage us to pray for one another as well as pastors, congregations and ministries beyond our doors. Beginning in February each Sunday there will be a list of people and/or ministries for which you are encouraged to pray each day. So, on Monday you may be asked to pray for individual people who are members or friends of Hope. Each day will list a different person. Let our prayers for one another be the foundation of our mission and ministry.

A Study Curriculum on Civic Life and Faith
Session 2: How Do Christians Address Controversial Civic Issues?
(in healthy and constructive ways)

1. We are called to seek justice and to look after the well-being of the most vulnerable members of society – the poor, widows, orphans, foreigners, and outcasts.
2. Christ's command to love our neighbors is often fulfilled through politics and citizenship.
3. Issues are controversial because:
 - a. They are important.
 - b. They are not easy to figure out.
4. Sometimes members of the same congregation will come to different conclusions about how they are called to act.
5. We must not take refuge in the thought that the other side is stupid or evil. We must understand, listen, pray, discern, act, and confess, realizing that we know in part, and see in part, and that another's differing, thoughtful conclusion deserves our respect and consideration.
6. Prayer and searching the scriptures must be part of the process and is often best done as part of a community.
7. The church has a long history of dealing with controversial civic and political issues from its origins. Some are:
 - a. Reformers pushed that schools be open for boys and girls regardless of social status or economic means.
 - b. Women of Liberia Mass Action for Peace called for peace among their violent men, through fasting that included abstaining from sexual intimacy. Soon there was peace.
 - c. And Many, Many more.
8. In summary, we seek understanding, we pray, we discern, and we act boldly with faith, love, and hope. We confess and ask God's forgiveness for the ways in which we inadvertently participate in the same injustices we are trying to remedy. Everything depends on grace. Thanks be to God.

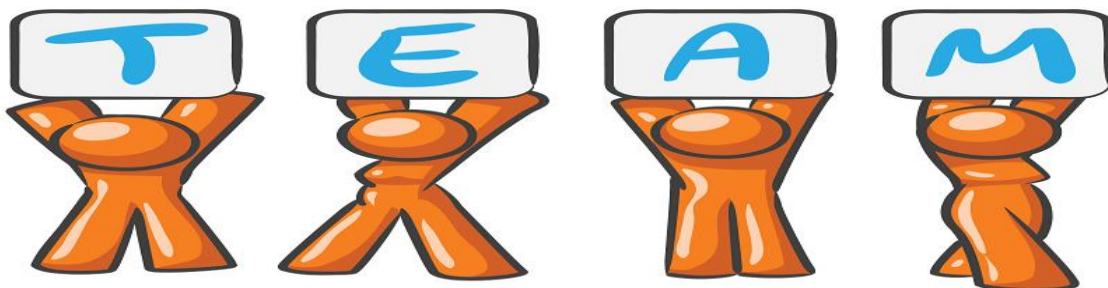
