




Starting Sunday, June 11th, we are about to begin something exciting and a bit different. Lutherans, along with Catholics and Episcopalians follow a three-year lectionary of lessons (labeled A, B, C, respectively). Just so we're clear, the lectionary is defined as "a list or book of portions of the Bible appointed to be read at a church service" (Oxford Language). Usually, the first lesson is taken from the Old Testament, the second lesson from the Epistles, and third lesson from the Gospels. For most of the year the Epistles and Gospels follow a sequential order in being read. Not so the Old Testament readings. Traditionally these readings have been used to emphasize the relevancy or truth of the New Testament readings. Unfortunately, this has often led to our getting pieces of a story, and/or incomplete understandings of a particular Old Testament text or even the entire book. To that end, the church decided it was time to rectify this. As a lover of the Old Testament, or what is more accurately termed the Hebrew Texts, I was thrilled with the development of the "Continuous" Lectionary, allowing a sequential and more complete reading of the Hebrew texts to occur in our worship services. In other words, this "Continuous Lectionary" recognizes the inherent value of these Old Testament stories in their own right. Please note that the 2nd lesson and the gospel lesson will remain the same throughout the year, in the same order as the traditional lectionary—the only change will be with the first lesson, the Old Testament reading. Of course, I won't always be preaching on these Old Testament texts, but the stories they tell will be sequential, and thus more complete, adding to our understanding of the scriptures overall. Remember the Old Testament or Hebrew texts are the scriptures on which Jesus was raised and upon which he based his understanding of who God was, and who he was as a Jewish man, part of God's chosen people. It is in these scriptures that Jesus found a guide to the mission to which God was calling him. I look forward to sharing this adventure with you over the next lectionary year.

Emotional Intelligence (EI)

It is generally accepted that success in life is better predicted by EI than IQ.

It is generally accepted that emotionally-aware congregations are usually better able to process the stresses that confront them than those congregations that are not. It could be useful for us, individually, to think our own thoughts about each of these emotions, and if any is so inclined, to share one's thoughts with another. In the last newsletter, I offered the emotion 'isolated' under the core emotion of 'Sad' and asked you to ponder your own thoughts.

These are my thoughts:

<u>isolated</u> – Several years ago, I was removed from a position of leadership, I was also not allowed to attend certain meetings. This was not because I was doing anything wrong but was because one individual had too much negative reactivity towards me. It was easier to exclude me than to insist that that individual properly manage his/her reactivity. I was their scapegoat. Rather than take joint responsibility for our struggles, they chose to solely blame me. They insisted that I needed to act more appropriately (that I needed to conform more), that I was the source of the problem. No one else was required to consider their contribution to the situation at hand. Peer pressure, ostracism, and shunning are powerful family system forces.


When treated the way I was, most people would have left. I have found that leaving tends to solve very little. Fortunately, I had supportive individuals outside of that family system. Their support enabled me to remain in contact instead of retreating to solitude apart from that family system. Choosing isolation is a form of fusion, the opposite of self-differentiation. Self-differentiation (to define self as distinct from other) is important. Kerr and Bowen (in "Family Evaluation") say that one, slightly more self-differentiated person, can improve the self-differentiation (the ability to function during times of stress) of a family system. During that time, I worked hard on my self-differentiation. Since isolation is the opposite of self-differentiation, it was important for me to remain in contact during those times when circumstances were very uncomfortable for me. I could not be of benefit to that family system if I was not present (if I was in isolation). Being present did not mean that I was always present. It was important that I listen to my personal limitations to deal with the discomfort, But, as noted in Freidman's "Failure of Nerve", I often prayed that God would help me to increase my capacity to tolerate the discomfort I was experiencing during that family system's pressure for homeostasis (for me to conform). To continue to self-define when others were pressuring me to conform was not easy, but that was the only way I could be of benefit to that family system at that time.

Next month, please consider your thoughts on 'disillusioned' under the core emotion of 'Surprise'.


