



We begin the month of November with All Saints Sunday. A day where we celebrate those we have lost throughout the year and for some of us throughout the years. How perfect that this church celebration coincides with the last of the green leaves upon the trees. If you notice though, the leaves don't fall from the trees while still green. Strangely enough the beauty of the peak fall colors, the reds, the burnished browns, the golds and flashy yellows, falsely indicate an immediacy of new life. I say falsely because this is not about new life but old life. These beautiful leaves are in the last throes of death. After this last burst of spectacular color, they will all but disintegrate completely, becoming brittle, and slowly devoid of color; their beauty and the life they have known will steadily begin to fade. And so we come to that most infamous of specters—death. In our fast-paced youth-oriented culture, we rarely talk about death as a society—as a matter of fact we avoid the topic as much as possible. We want nothing to do with anything that would remind us of our own mortality. But nature takes another approach. It's as if the turning leaves are celebrating as opposed to trying to avoid what is to come. Right before their demise they burst into a brilliancy, especially here in upstate New York, that few states can contend with (and yes, I admit that all states have lovely falls, but none so breathtaking as the autumn of Upstate New York). It's almost as if the trees in their wisdom know that death will not have the final say.

"We'll show you death" they say, "we do not fear you, for we know that death is just a veil which we pass through on our way to life with God and those who have gone before us. We know that God is faithful and that new life will follow this cycle of death, that spring will bring an abundance of new life. And we will be part of that new life. And so death, we will celebrate that which is to come."

As Christians we know this too—with Jesus' life, death and resurrection, we know that death will not have the final say over any of God's creation. And so we too, as part of God's creation, light candles of celebration and remembrance during All Saints Sunday. We remember all the ancestors whom we have lost throughout this past year and all the Saints that have gone before us throughout the years. The lighted candles remind us that the light of Christ lives in them and cannot be extinguished by death. As the wisdom of the trees teach us, death is just a veil; through God's grace the light and beauty of life still goes on.

May your hearts find peace knowing that the light and life of your loved ones continue beyond this earthly life that we know.


Book Group Reads Lessons from Lucy by Dave Barry

Poinsettia Plant – Poisonous to Pets?

Not according to the article "Holiday Health Hazards" from the College of Veterinary Medicine at Washington State University. In the article <u>http://www.vetmed.wsu.edu/ClientED/holiday.aspx</u>, it is stated that poinsettias "...are not very toxic to pets. They do contain a milky sap that can irritate the mouth but if signs develop, they are usually mild." Further research online supporting this can be found at numerous sites including the

ASPCA's site (http://www.aspca.org/pet-care/poison-control/plants/poinsettia.html) which states that for pets, poinsettias are "irritating to the mouth and stomach, sometimes causing vomiting, but are generally over-rated in toxicity" and that "While poinsettias are commonly "hyped" as poisonous plants, they rarely are, and the poisoning is greatly exaggerated" (http://www.petpoisonhelpline.com/poison/poinsettia).
