## St. Luke, Apostle & Evangelist: October 18

October 18<sup>th</sup> is the day the Church traditionally recognizes St. Luke, the writer of the Gospel Luke and the Acts of the Apostles. Scholars believe that Luke was born between 1 CE and 16 CE in modern



Turkey. He died between 84 CE and 100 CE in modern Greece at the age of 84.

St. Luke is our go to when we think of healing ministry. Luke is often depicted as a Physician with a book or pen, accompanied by a winged ox or calf as well as a brush or a palette. Luke is the patron saint of artists, notaries, bachelors, physicians, goldsmiths, butchers, brewers, and glass workers.

The Gospel of Luke and The Acts of the Apostles give us the stories of Jesus and the early Church with great detail. Traditionally, Luke's birth stories of Jesus are the favorite readings during the Advent and Christmas seasons. The Acts story of the coming of the Holy Spirit is read on Pentecost Sunday. Because of Luke's account, many congregations include Pentecost readings in diverse languages and voices. We learn about the Apostle Paul, his conversion and three journeys in the first-person voice of Luke who was his companion on much of his travels. St, Paul mentions Luke in his letters to Philemon, Colossians and 2<sup>nd</sup> Timothy.

Consider reading both the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles during the next two months. On December 1<sup>st</sup> we will begin to hear Luke's Gospel in the third year of our Common Lectionary readings.

#### **Our Most Sacred Duty**

"If any of you cause one of these little ones who believe in me to sin, it would be better for you if a great millstone were hung around your neck and you were thrown into the sea."

Mark 9:42

The cost of harming children. Jesus attempts to bring the disciples along through a series of really graphic pains – hanging a millstone around your neck and throwing you into the sea, followed by cutting off various limbs or tearing out your eye if they cause you to sin. Oh Jesus, that gets our attention. So, Jesus is not messing around when he tries to get the disciples to focus on who and what is important in his ministry. Protecting the children, protecting and serving all who are the most vulnerable.

In promoting our upcoming film event, I was asked to share why Cherish All Children's work is important and why we work to engage churches to prevent sexual exploitation. I shared that children and youth are experiencing significant mental health challenges at an alarming rate over these past several years. As adults, we can come together to learn more and engage in supporting young people as they navigate the pressures of social media, addictive online games and apps, and online exploitation. Identifying how we can best support youth through times of stress, anxiety, and depression will help decrease their vulnerabilities to an exploiter or trafficker. And I shared this quote:

"The protection of children is a society's most sacred duty."

This, in the context of educating the public about sextortion – one of the fastest growing online crimes. Young boys are specifically being targeted (and youth of all genders), tragically resulting in some taking their lives as they feel trapped and afraid. We have the power to stop it. The FBI, Homeland Security, and the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children are urging parents and caregivers to talk to children about how to prevent this, and what to do if they are targeted online. Jesus, guide our conversations with the young people in our lives, that we may share your never-ending love and act on our sacred duty to protect children and all who are vulnerable. Amen.

#### Poinsettia Plant - Poisonous to Pets?

Not according to the article "Holiday Health Hazards" from the College of Veterinary Medicine at Washington State University. In the article <a href="http://www.vetmed.wsu.edu/ClientED/holiday.aspx">http://www.vetmed.wsu.edu/ClientED/holiday.aspx</a>, it is stated that poinsettias "...are not very toxic to pets. They do contain a milky sap that can irritate the mouth but if signs develop, they are usually mild." Further research online supporting this can be found at numerous sites including the

ASPCA's site (<a href="http://www.aspca.org/pet-care/poison-control/plants/poinsettia.html">http://www.aspca.org/pet-care/poison-control/plants/poinsettia.html</a>) which states that for pets, poinsettias are "irritating to the mouth and stomach, sometimes causing vomiting, but are generally over-rated in toxicity" and that "While poinsettias are commonly "hyped" as poisonous plants, they rarely are, and the poisoning is greatly exaggerated" (http://www.petpoisonhelpline.com/poison/poinsettia).
