
- ¹ The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.

I am always amazed by people who have memorized scripture. Yet I have never felt it was necessary to do so. Not because I think scripture is unimportant, but because I think memorizing scripture without a deeper understanding of what it truly means is dangerous. There are too many who misquote scripture, using it not as a means of grace for themselves or others, but using it instead as a weapon of judgement and divisiveness. There are those who hide behind this ability by using it to keep from taking responsibility for making the decisions God has given them the free will with which to do so. They instead blame God for everything, when in truth some decisions made have nothing whatsoever to do with God. This is the negative side of quoting scripture. Yet there are many positives to memorizing key passages of scripture which speak to us. In times of trial and tribulation, when there are no words, memorized passages will often come into our hearts and minds, giving us strength to make it through the day. Memorized passages can also fill us with a sense of peace and joy in those moments when the world surprises us with the unexpected beauty of human connections and an appreciation for the creation of life which surrounds us. Memorized scripture passages can also rise up to comfort another when words leave us. So I have decided that I would like to memorize some key passages beginning with the 23rd psalm. A psalm which my mother loved dearly (key scripture passages can also stay in our hearts reminding us of loved ones no longer with us). You don't have to memorize scripture to have a deep faith. But still, there is something to be said for taking the time to memorize scripture and letting it enter your heart. I think I will try. Perhaps you will too.


Sandra Governor took over the role of choir organizer when I stepped away because of my chemo treatments. Sandra now needs to step down because of other church commitments.

HEALING TEAM CELEBRATES ST. LUKE, THE EVANGELIST

on Sunday, October 19 Healing Worship and Installation of Eucharistic Ministers.

On October 19th, Bonny Mounteer, Maureen Hoffman and Daniel Hoh will be recognized as Eucharistic Ministers, trained to visit and to offer bread and wine from Hope's Sunday Holy Communion to the ill, hospitalized or homebound members of Hope Lutheran Church. Opportunity for prayer and anointing will be offered as part of October 19 worship.


St. Luke, The Evangelist is celebrated on October 18 each year. We remember St. Luke as a companion of St Paul sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ around the Roman Empire, focusing on the gentile population. His writings in St. Luke's Gospel and The Acts of the Apostles give rich stories of Jesus, his disciples and the early Christian Church and its evangelists.

The New Testament mentions Luke in The Acts of the Apostles and the Epistle to the Colossians refers to him as a physician (from Greek for 'one who heals'); thus he is thought to have been both a physician and a disciple of Paul. Since the early years of the faith, Christians have regarded him as a saint. He is believed to have been a martyr, reportedly having been hanged from an olive tree. Saint Luke the Evangelist is considered a patron saint of artists, physicians, bachelors, notaries, butchers, brewers, glass workers, goldsmiths and others.

The first Oktoberfest was held in Germany on 12 October 1810 to celebrate the wedding of Crown Prince Ludwig and Princess Therese of Saxony-Hildburghausen. The festival featured a horse race modelled on the medieval Scharlachrennen once run at the Karlstor. Major Andreas Michael Dall'Armi of the National Guard proposed the idea, although coachman Franz Baumgartner later claimed credit. The race was repeated in 1811, forming the core of the Oktoberfest tradition.

Forty-five million Americans claim German heritage, making German Americans the second-largest ethnic group_ in the U.S., after British Americans. German Americans have shaped U.S. society since the beginning, helping forge founding principles, such as freedom of the press, and later fighting for the abolition of slavery. Prominent German Americans include former President Dwight Eisenhower, writer John Steinbeck and physicist Albert Einstein, who immigrated to the U.S. in 1933.

Poinsettia Plant - Poisonous to Pets?

Not according to the article "Holiday Health Hazards" from the College of Veterinary Medicine at Washington State University. In the article http://www.vetmed.wsu.edu/ClientED/holiday.aspx, it is stated that poinsettias "...are not very toxic to pets. They do contain a milky sap that can irritate the mouth but if signs develop, they are usually mild." Further research online supporting this can be found at numerous sites including the

ASPCA's site (http://www.aspca.org/pet-care/poison-control/plants/poinsettia.html) which states that for pets, poinsettias are "irritating to the mouth and stomach, sometimes causing vomiting, but are generally over-rated in toxicity" and that "While poinsettias are commonly "hyped" as poisonous plants, they rarely are, and the poisoning is greatly exaggerated" (http://www.petpoisonhelpline.com/poison/poinsettia).
