




Prayer to Be Reckoned With

HEALING AND INCARNATION

We don't usually focus on Jesus and the healing stories during Advent and Christmas. We love the stories of the baby Jesus with all our memories of children's programs, caroling adventures, and the glow of candles as we softly share the words of Silent Night.

When asked by a colleague about my favorite image of Christmas, without thought I answered the "incarnation." "Incarnation" is a truly churchy word meaning the embodiment of God the Son in human flesh as Jesus Christ (according to the Oxford Dictionary). As I thought about my commitment to sharing newsletter articles about healing for December, I realized that the there is a strong connection between healing and incarnation. As I fell asleep last night, I had a reminder that we always talk about how Jesus did healing during his earthly years. Then I realized that not only did he do healing, he was healing for the world and for you and me. Contemplating how to share that idea in words led me to Marty Haugen's hymn which we often sing. Living Our Strengths

First, the not so good news. It is apparent that the church in its present form is suffering from losses. It's not the kind of problem that can be fixed by building new buildings or widening the parking lots.



Second. the good news is that there is potential out there just waiting to be harnessed. We are that *potential* just waiting to be unleashed to fulfill God's purposes not only for the Church at large, but especially for the Church right here on the corner of Winter Street and Bloomingrove.

All too often we have long discussions about what we used to have or what we don't have. And we spend hours brainstorming how we can fill *our* needs.

Here's a reality check: God has given us a unique combination of strengths and talents. God has placed within us a calling to serve others and to tell the Good News of Jesus Christ--- a calling to ministry.

Last spring, we learned about the assets of Hope (building, grounds, ministries) and the assets of many of our members. We began to strengthen some of the ministries already in place based on those assets. Yet there are assets and strengths within and among us that are untapped.

How to identify those strengths is the next phase of our Congregational Leadership Initiative. Members of Hope's Initiative Team (HIT) participated in a strength identification process through a book called *Living Your Strengths: Discover your God-given talents and inspire your community* from Gallup. Included with each book is a Clifton Strengths Assessment tool which helps individuals discover their God-given strengths that are just waiting to be used on a journey of ministry.

The books will be available for your purchase in January. The HIT will join Hope strength finders for discussion not only of personal strengths, but also ways we might be called to use those strengths individually and as a congregation. Please speak with any of the team members to learn more about the book and what they learned about God's gifts to each of them. 
We would like to thank the Hope Community for all the support, prayers, flowers and food during such a difficult time.

Emotional Intelligence (EI)

It is generally accepted that success in life is better predicted by El than IQ. It is generally accepted that emotionally-aware congregations are usually better able to process the stresses that confront them than those congregations that are not. It could be useful for us, individually, to think our own thoughts about each of these emotions, and if any is so inclined, to share one's thoughts with another. In the last newsletter, I offered the emotion 'important' under the core emotion of 'Joy' and asked you to ponder your own thoughts.

These are my thoughts:

important — (of great significance or value; likely to have a profound effect on success, survival, or well-being) Throughout much of my life, I have found that organizations limit the opportunities for self-expression. They are more interested in having me fit a prescribed niche than in making the best use of me. I have always been one who lives to the beat of a different drum and have found that society is not very receptive to that. I have not, very often, found opportunities that embrace my primary gifts. Too often, the best part of me lies dormant. Too often, the expression of my most precious has been unvalued. However, I realize that the world does not revolve around me and that others, too, struggle to find opportunities for self-actualization, to find a place to be their unhindered selves. My solution has been to find satisfaction in honoring the needs of those around me, trusting that God will see to mine according to His/Her Grace and in the fullness of Her/His time.





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
